## 1.0 Executive Insights

#### Introduction

The 2012 Quality of Life survey was a partnership between six New Zealand Councils. The survey aims to measure respondents' perceptions in several domains, including:

- · Quality of life
- · Health and wellbeing
- · Crime and safety
- · Community, culture and social networks
- · Council decision-making processes
- Environment
- Public Transport
- Lifestyle work and study.

This following report presents the results for the Six Council areas. City level reports are also available for five of the six Councils.

#### Methodology

This survey was carried out using a sequential-mixed methodology. A random selection, of residents (from the Six Councils) was made from the Electoral Roll and respondents were encouraged to complete the survey online or via a hard copy questionnaire posted to them.

Fieldwork took place between 17 August and 16 October 2012.

Completed questionnaires were received from 5,151 respondents made up of 2,593 Auckland residents, 432 Porirua residents, 468 Hutt residents, 504 Wellington City residents, 567 Christchurch City residents, and 587 Dunedin residents.

#### **Quality of Life**

The majority (80%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas rate their overall quality of life positively, with 19% rating it as *extremely good* and 61% as *good*.

Just under a quarter (24%) of the Six Council areas' residents say their quality of life has increased compared with twelve months ago.

## Health and Wellbeing

#### Overall health

Eight in ten (82%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas rate their health positively, responding with a rating of either excellent (15%), very good (31%), or good (36%).

#### **Barriers to GP usage**

Less than a quarter (18%) of residents had an occasion in the last twelve months when they needed to see a GP but didn't get to see a doctor at all.

The most commonly mentioned reason for needing to, but not getting to see a GP was because it was too expensive or costly to go to the doctor (46%), followed by the health issue seemed too minor or not serious enough to go to the doctor (31%).

#### Frequency of doing physical activity

Just under half (48%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas say they undertake physical activity five or more days a week.

#### **Emotional wellbeing**

The majority (71%) of residents rate themselves as having a positive emotional wellbeing, with a rating of *very happy* (17%) or *happy* (54%).

#### Satisfaction with life in general

Just over two thirds (69%) of the Six Council areas' residents are satisfied with their life in general.

#### **Stress**

Almost two in ten (18%) residents living in the Six Council areas are regularly experiencing stress that has a negative impact on them, with 2% *always* stressed and 16% stressed *most of the time*.

#### **Availability of support**

The majority (91%) of residents say they have someone to turn to for help if they were faced with a serious illness or injury, or needed emotional support during a difficult time.





## Crime and Safety

#### Perceptions of crime and other undesirable problems

Just under half (47%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas view vandalism as a problem within their area over the last twelve months. Close to three in five (59%) view car theft or damage to cars as a problem, while around two thirds (67%) view dangerous driving (including drink driving and speeding) as a problem. Nearly half (45%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas perceive the presence of unsafe people as being a problem and six in every ten (59%) perceive alcohol or drugs to be a problem in their area over the last twelve months.

#### Sense of safety

The majority (96%) of residents feel safe in their home during the day, while around nine in ten (90%) feel safe in their home after dark. Nearly six in ten (58%) residents feel safe walking alone in their neighbourhood after dark.

The majority (91%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas feel safe in their city centre during the day, while just over four in ten (42%) feel safe in their city centre after dark.

#### Safety of children

Around seven in ten (71%) residents living in the Six Council areas rated the safety of unsupervised children in their neighbourhood as *very safe* or *fairly safe*.

#### Community, Culture and Social Networks

#### Sense of community

Nearly three quarters (73%) of residents living in the Six Council areas agree it is important to feel a sense of community with the people in their local neighbourhood. Just over half (53%) of the residents agree that they actually feel a sense of community with others in their local neighbourhood.

The most commonly mentioned reason for a lack of sense of community is a busy life (42%). This is followed by people in the neighbourhood don't talk with each other (41%) and a preference for socialising with family and friends instead of neighbours (37%)

#### Impact of greater cultural diversity

Around half (52%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas feel that the fact that New Zealand is becoming a home for an increasing number of people with different lifestyles and cultures from different countries makes their area a better place to live.

The most commonly mentioned reason for greater cultural diversity having a positive impact is people from other countries and cultures make the city more vibrant and interesting, including bringing more interesting food and restaurants (62%).

The most commonly mentioned reason for greater cultural diversity having a negative impact is *people from other countries and cultures don't integrate into New Zealand society* (67%).





#### Social networks

The most common social network residents belong to is people from work or school (47%), followed by online network through websites such as Facebook, Twitter, online gaming communities and forums (46%).

#### Feeling of isolation

Nearly two thirds (65%) of residents living in the Six Council areas rarely felt isolated or lonely over the past twelve months.

#### Culturally rich and diverse arts scene

Nearly half (47%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas agree their area / city has a culturally rich and diverse arts scene.

#### Trust

Around six in ten (62%) residents say you can trust people, with 7% saying people can almost always be trusted and 55% saying people can usually be trusted.

#### Council Decision-Making Processes

Nearly three in ten (29%) residents living in the Six Council areas agree they understand the Council decision making process. Just over half (56%) agree that they would like to have more say in what the Council does, while just over a third (36%) agree that they have confidence that the Council makes decisions in the best interests of their city. Around four in ten (37%) residents living in the Six Council areas say the public has an influence on the decisions the Council makes.

#### Built and Natural Environment

#### Pride in city's look and feel

Just over three quarters (76%) of residents living in the Six Council areas agree that their city/local area is a great place to live. Nearly six in ten (58%) *strongly agree* or *agree* that they feel a sense or pride in the way their city or local area looks and feels.

The most frequently mentioned reasons given by those with a positive sense of pride is a *good overall lifestyle* and *parks, green or open spaces or gardens* (55%, respectively).

The two most frequently mentioned reasons for those without a positive sense of pride are *crime and safety issues* (39%) and *issues with transport system* (33%)

#### Ease of access to local park or other green space

The majority (91%) of residents living in the Six Council areas find it *very easy* or *easy* to get to a local park or other green space in their city or local area.

#### Perceptions of rubbish and pollution

Just over half (52%) of the Six Council areas' residents perceive rubbish or litter to be a problem in their area over the last twelve months. Around six in ten (61%) perceive graffiti to be a problem, while a quarter (25%) perceive air pollution to be a problem. Around four in ten (43%) perceive water pollution to be a problem and a similar number (41%) perceive noise pollution to be a problem.





#### Public Transport

#### Frequency of use of public transport

One in five (20%) of the Six Council areas' residents are regular users of public transport (twice a week or more often).

#### Perceptions of public transport

Nearly half (46%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas agree that public transport is affordable. Three quarters (75%) agree it is safe, while a similar number (73%) agree it is easy to get to. Just over half (56%) agree public transport is frequent, and nearly half (48%) agree it is reliable.

#### Lifestyle – Work and Study

#### **Employment status**

Just over half (52%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas are employed full time (for 30 hours or more a week). In addition to this 16% are in part time work. One fifth (20%) are not in paid employment and are not looking for work, while 6% are not in paid employment but are looking for work.

#### Balance between work and other aspects of life

Around six in ten (61%) residents are satisfied with the balance between work and other aspects of life.

#### Ability to cover costs of everyday needs

Around one in ten (12%) residents living in the Six Council areas *have more than enough money*. Close to three in ten (29%) say they have *enough money*, while a third (33%) say they have *just enough money*.





## 2.0 Research Design

#### 2.1 Background

#### Quality of Life Survey

The Quality of Life Survey is carried out every two years.

Previous Quality of Life surveys were carried out using Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI). Due to the relatively expensive nature of CATI, the Quality of Life survey team were keen to explore other potential methodologies for the 2012 survey, and chose a sequential mixed methodology for the 2012 survey.

## 2.2 Overview of method and sample

The full target population for the 2012 Quality of Life survey was people aged 18 years and over who reside in the participating cities:

- Auckland
- Hutt City
- Porirua
- Wellington
- Christchurch
- Dunedin

This survey outlines results for the **Six Councils**. The total six councils sample was 5,700.

The Electoral Roll was used as the sampling frame, as it is the most comprehensive database of individuals in New Zealand.

In previous measures, the survey was carried out using Computer Aided Telephone Interviewing (CATI). Due to the relatively expensive nature of CATI interviewing, the Survey Team was keen to explore other potential methodologies for the 2012 survey.

The methodology selected for 2012 is a sequential mixed methodology. This survey used a self-completion methodology, with respondents being encouraged to complete the survey online initially before being provided with a paper questionnaire. Under this method, all individuals on the Electoral Roll are eligible for selection (as opposed to just those who are successfully matched with a phone number – approx. 40% in the previous CATI surveys).

The research took place between 17 August 2012, when the first invitation letters were sent, and 16 October 2012 when the survey closed.

Full details of the survey methodology can be found in the Quality of Life Survey 2012 Technical Report.





An overview of the research process is shown below:

Electoral Roll • Sample was selected from the Electoral Roll using predictive models based on previous Quality of Life and other experience to oversample the hard-to-reach groups.

Invitation Letters  Invitation letters were sent to named respondents introducing the research and inviting them to complete the survey online

Reminder Postcard 1  Ten days later, a reminder postcard was sent to those who have not completed the survey.

Survey Pack  Ten days after the reminder postcard, those who had not completed were sent a hard copy survey.

Reminder Postcard 2 • A final reminder was sent to those who had still not completed two weeks later.

## 2.3 Response to survey

From the 18,650 of the Six Council areas' residents selected randomly from the Electoral Roll, 5,151 completed questionnaires were received. The response rate for this survey was 33%. This is calculated as the number of completed interviews as a proportion of total number of selections minus exclusions based on known outcomes (e.g. death, moved out of region, gone no address).

For further details on response rate and a breakdown by city, please see Section 2.13 of the Quality of Life Technical Report.

Across the whole Six Councils survey, 57% of the surveys were completed online and 43% were completed by hard copy.

The average length of the online survey was 17.7 minutes.





#### 2.4 Reporting

The following are notes regarding the analysis in the Six Councils Report: Significant differences

The differences reported between the total and sub-groups in the Six Councils report are significant at the 95% confidence level and greater than 5%.

For rating scale questions, significant differences are reported at top-two or bottomtwo box level (e.g. for a scale of extremely good, good, neither poor nor good, poor and extremely poor, differences have been tested between sub-groups for extremely good + good).

For open ended questions, significant differences are shown for the top two or three responses, (as outlined in the first chart commentary for that question).

For open ended questions only responses with 2% or more of respondents are shown in the charts, for full results to these questions see Appendix II.

Any differences at top-two box level (or within the top-two of these most frequently mentioned responses for open ended questions) that are not mentioned in the commentary are not significant and greater than 5%.

Non-Auckland significant differences have not been mentioned.

#### Nets

For those results charted in the report, nets are based on the rounded number shown in the charts, not the unrounded figures in the data tables.

#### Base sizes

All base sizes shown on charts and on tables (n=) are unweighted base sizes.

Please note that any base size of under n=100 is considered small and under n=30 is considered extremely small and therefore results should be viewed with caution.

#### Ethnicity netts

In this report total ethnicity is reported rather than prioritised ethnicity (as was used in 2006 reports). This means a person who selected multiple ethnicities will be counted in more than one ethnic group and ethnicity percentages add to more than 100.

#### "Other specify" questions

Responses to "other specify" questions are split out based on codes that were included in the questionnaire and those that have been created based on the themes that emerged from respondents' answers (when specifying an 'other' response).





## 2.5 Margin of Error

All sample surveys are subject to sampling error. Based on a total sample size of 5,151 respondents, the results shown in this survey are subject to a maximum sampling error of plus or minus 1.4% at the 95% confidence level. That is, there is a 95% chance that the true population value of a recorded figure of 50% actually lies between 48.6% and 51.4%. As the sample figure moves further away from 50%, so the error margin will decrease.

## 3.0 Quality of Life

This section looks into the overall quality of life of residents within the Six Council areas and how it has changed in the past 12 months.


3.1 Overall Quality of Life

The majority (80%) of the residents in the Six Council areas rate their overall quality of life positively, with 19% rating it as extremely good and 61% as good.

Those more likely to rate their quality of life positively (extremely good or good) are:

Living in Wellington (88%)

3.2 Quality of Life compared to 12 months ago Just under a quarter (24%) of residents living in the Six Council areas say their quality of life has increased compared with twelve months ago.


Those more likely to say their quality of life has increased (*increased significantly* or *increased to some extent*) compared to twelve months ago are:

- Living in Porirua (30%)
- Living in Wellington (30%).

Those more likely to say their quality of life has decreased (decreased significantly or decreased to some extent) compared to twelve months ago are:

• Living in Christchurch (35%, compared with the Six Councils total of 21%).









## 4.0 Health and Wellbeing

This section looks at people's health and wellbeing, covering aspects such as usage of General Practitioners, the amount of exercise and physical activity that people undertake and residents' emotional wellbeing.


#### 4.1 Overall Health

Eight in ten (82%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas rate their health positively, responding with a rating of either excellent (15%), very good (31%), or good (36%).

Those more likely to rate their health positively (excellent, or very good) are:

• Living in Wellington (86%)

Figure 4.1: Overall health (%)








## 4.2 Usage of GP

Less than a quarter (18%) of residents living in the Six Council areas had an occasion in the last twelve months when they needed to see a GP or doctor about their own health, but didn't get to see a doctor at all.

There are no statistically significant differences by location.


Figure 4.2: Wanted to see a GP in the last twelve months but didn't get to (%)





For those who wanted to see a GP or doctor in the past twelve months, but didn't get to, the most commonly mentioned reason for nearly half (46%) was that it was *too expensive or costly*. For nearly a third (31%) the *issue seemed too minor or not serious enough*.






4.3 Frequency of Doing Physical Activity Just under half (48%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas say they undertake physical activity five or more days a week.

Figure 4.3: Frequency of doing physical activity (%)








#### 4.4 Emotional Wellbeing

Figure 4.4: Emotional wellbeing (%)






#### 4.5 Satisfaction with Life in General

Figure 4.5: Satisfaction with life in general (%)





Figure 4.6: Frequency of experiencing stress (%)






#### 4.7 Availability of Support

Just under half (47%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas view vandalism as a problem within their area over the last twelve months, with 10% indicating it is a big problem and a further 37% indicating it is a bit of a problem in their area.


Those more likely to have rated vandalism as a problem (a big problem or a bit of a problem) are:

- Living in Christchurch (67%)
- Living in Porirua (61%)
- Living in Hutt City (59%).

Those less likely to have rated vandalism as a problem (a big problem or a bit of a problem) are:

- Living in Auckland (41%)
- Living in Wellington (41%).

Figure 5.1.1: Vandalism as a problem (%)






Close to three in five (59%) residents living in the Six Council areas view car theft or damage to cars as a problem within their area over the last twelve months, with 14% indicating it is a big problem and a further 45% indicating it is a bit of a problem in their area.

Those more likely to view car theft or damage to cars as a problem (a big problem or a bit of a problem) are:

- Living in Porirua (71%)
- Living in Dunedin (66%).


Those more likely to view dangerous driving as a problem (a big problem or a bit of a problem) are:

Figure 5.1.3: Dangerous driving as a problem (%)








Nearly half (45%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas perceive the presence of unsafe people as being a problem in their area in the last twelve months, with 8% indicating it is a big problem and a further 37% indicating it is a bit of a problem in their area.

Those more likely to perceive the presence of unsafe people as a problem (a big problem or a bit of a problem) are:

- Living in Porirua (59%)
- Living in Hutt City (55%).

Almost six in every ten (59%) of residents living in the Six Council areas perceive alcohol or drugs to be a problem in their area over the last twelve months, with 18% indicating it is *a big problem* and a further 41% indicating it is *a bit of a problem* in their area.


Those more likely to view alcohol or drugs as a problem (a big problem or a bit of a problem) are:

- Living in Dunedin (80%)
- Living in Christchurch (75%)
- Living in Porirua (73%)
- Living in Wellington (71%)
- Living in Hutt City (67%)

• Living in Auckland (51%).

Figure 5.1.5: Alcohol or drug problems (%)






5.2 Sense of Safety Almost all (96%) residents living in the Six Council areas feel safe in their home during the day, responding with a rating of *very safe* (72%) or *fairly safe* (24%).

There are no statistically significant differences by location.

Nine in ten (90%) residents living in the Six Council areas feel safe in their home after dark, responding with a rating of *very safe* (53%) or *fairly safe* (37%).

There are no statistically significant differences by location, for residents in the Six Council areas for feeling safe in their home after dark.

Figure 5.2.2: Sense of safety in your home after dark (%)




Nearly six in ten (58%) of residents living in the Six Council areas feel safe walking alone in their neighbourhood after dark, responding with a rating of *very safe* (17%) or *fairly safe* (41%).

Those who are more likely to feel safe (very safe or fairly safe) are:

- Living in Wellington (75%)
- Living in Dunedin (70%).

Figure 5.2.3: Sense of safety walking alone in your neighbourhood after dark (%)







Figure 5.2.4: Sense of safety in your city centre during the day (%)






Just over four in ten (42%) residents living in the Six Council areas feel safe in their city centre after dark, responding with a rating of *very safe* (7%) or *fairly safe* (35%).

Those more likely to feel safe (very safe or fairly safe) are:

- Living in Wellington (65%)
- Living in Hutt City (50%)

Figure 5.2.5: Sense of safety in your city centre after dark (%)








#### 5.3 Safety of Children



Figure 6.1: Importance of sense of community (%)









6.2 Impact of Greater Cultural Diversity Around half (52%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas feel that the fact that New Zealand is becoming a home for an increasing number of people with different lifestyles and cultures from different countries makes their area a better place to live, with 14% saying it is a much better place to live and 38% saying it is a better place to live.



Figure 6.4: Perception of impact of greater cultural diversity (%)










Figure 6.8: Location of social networks (%)





Figure 6.10: Culturally rich and diverse arts scene (%)










Figure 7.1: Understanding of Council decision making processes (%)













Figure 8.2: Pride in city's look and feel (%)















Figure 8.9: Water pollution (%)







Figure 9.1: Frequency of use of public transport (%)

















## 10.0 Lifestyle

This section looks into people's employment and education, satisfaction with work life balance and the ability to cover the costs of everyday living.

#### 10.1 Employment Status

Just over half (52%) of the residents living in the Six Council areas are employed full time (for 30 hours or more a week). In addition to this 16% are in part-time work. One fifth (20%) are not in paid employment and are not looking for work, while 6% are not in paid in employment but are looking for work.






